Possible considerations:

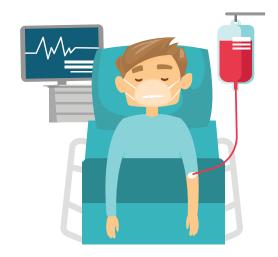
- · The family member had already registered as an organ donor

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Scenario B

- Personal health conditions
- Whether there are other potential donors
- Relationship with the family member/recipient
